Getting a library card is now easier than ever with a new online registration option for customers ages 13 and older. Simply, <u>click here</u> or visit <u>www.memphislibrary.org</u> and select the icon, "Apply Online Now for a Library Card". After a few steps, customers will receive a temporary card number for 30 days to immediately access the Library's e-collection. To fully activate the account and to receive an actual card, customers must visit any Memphis Public Library location with the required documentation (i.e. valid Tennessee driver's license, state ID, voter registration card, current utility bill, printed check, lease, or check stub).

The gift that keeps on giving, a library card is a free way to gain access to a variety of content. Customers of all ages can travel the world, experience different cultures, or expand their skill set with a single card.
