TECH TIP: Oh No! What's My iPhone Passcode? Use Recovery Mode?

If you forget your passcode, or worse, somehow a passcode gets set on your iPhone or tablet without your knowledge (think public iPad class), you will have six chances to enter in a passcode. If all are unsuccessful, your device will be disabled. However, there is a process that will reset your device to factory default settings, which allows you access.

If you've never synced with iTunes or set up Find My iPhone in iCloud, you'll need to use **Recovery Mode** to restore your



device. This will erase the device content and settings and its passcode.

- 1. Connect your device to a computer with iTunes installed.
- 2. While your device is connected, **Force Restart** it. Press and hold the **Sleep/Wake** and **Home** buttons at the same time. Don't let go when you see the Apple logo; keep holding until you see the recovery mode screen.
- 3. When you see the option to Restore or Update, choose Restore.
- 4. iTunes will download software for your device. If it takes more than 15 minutes, your device will exit recovery mode, and you will need to repeat steps 2 and 3.
- 5. Wait for the process to finish. Then, you can set up and use your device.

Travel Authorization Forms and Procedures

The City of Memphis provides leave for business-related and professional development events. In accordance with the policy (62-05), if an employee travels outside Shelby County for approved business travel, we are required to complete a Travel Authorization Form and a Travel Expense Report to be submitted to Director McCloy at least three weeks prior to the first day of travel. Please ensure:

- All forms are completed correctly and include the requisite signatures. On both forms, all expense totals will be \$0.00, as we reimburse travel expenses through the generosity of the Friends of the Library.
- Attach a cover memo that is addressed to Director McCloy from me that states the nature of the trip/event and the dates of travel. If available, please attach information about the event (i.e. web page, agenda, flyer, etc.)
- Forms are to be signed by agency manager, regional manager and forwarded to the director.

Thank you for your efforts in ensuring we maintain compliance with this very important policy.

Norvel was committed to making a difference in the lives of youth. Prior to working for Memphis Public Libraries, she was an English teacher at Holly Springs High School for 10 years. Later, she began working for the Library System, and on April 1, 2015, she was recognized for 30 years of service to the City of Memphis. She worked in Library administration as Northeast Regional Manager, overseeing operations at eight branches.

To commemorate Norvel's vision, commitment, and lasting contributions, Memphis Public Library employees raised \$1,700 in her honor.





"Norvel always wanted whatever she did to benefit others," Gay recalled. "She was an educator and a librarian, and she encouraged everyone she encountered to learn and to pursue excellence." A committee was formed to determine the best way to commemorate Norvel's legacy, and it was decided that funds would be used to purchase children's material for the Library System. Items will be housed at Whitehaven Library, since it is the "home branch" for Norvel's family, but the collection will benefit children throughout Memphis Public Libraries. Norvel's daughter, Ursula, made suggestions about which titles and authors

Norvel and McKenzie would have enjoyed reading together, like books by author Margaree King Mitchell and children's biographies about African Americans.

In April 2012, Norvel met author Margaree King Mitchell, who was visiting Memphis Public Libraries and had several kind things to say about Norvel on Facebook.

"I had a great host [while visiting the library in Memphis] - Norvel Adams-Walker. She is absolutely wonderful, and she loves the Memphis Public Library System. I'm impressed with the community outreach and all the different programs that the library offers. It is a great system! And, Norvel is a great ambassador for it," Mitchell told her Facebook followers.

Because of Norvel's passion for youth, libraries, and learning, Gay said a children's book collection was an ideal way to honor our dear co-worker and friend.

"We are pleased that Ursula liked the idea of using the money for children's materials," Gay commented. "Ursula said that she knows Norvel would be happy and that she would be happy also with any other titles, authors, or subject areas needed to complete the collection."

Currently, the Collection Development Department is adding additional books to the collection. A special gift plate will appear inside of each book and will include a photo of Norvel and her granddaughter McKenzie along with an honorary message.



Thanks to the joint efforts and hard work of Friends volunteers and Library employees, nearly \$18,000 was raised during the two-day sale. More than 2,600 customers attended the sale on the first day, Friday, May 27; and more than 3,000 shoppers attended the sale on Saturday, May 28. In addition, Second Editions Bookstore sold \$1,200 in merchandise for each of the two days of the Friends' Book Sale.

"Thanks to *everyone* for adding to the success of the sale," said Friends of the Library president Jacque Jenkins. "Without each and every one of you, we could not do what we love to do for the Library — make money! I think we paid for Explore Memphis," she said enthusiastically.
